Welcome to EWIS 2016! The European Workshops in International Studies are the smaller of the two main annual conferences of the European International Studies Association – but small now means 300 participants! This shows that the workshop format is attractive to many of our members. The chance to discuss papers in-depth in a more informal setting while still enjoying the conference surroundings and being able to mingle with colleagues across the discipline give EWIS its particular atmosphere.

And if you have some time before or after the workshops, rent a car to climb up to the Hohenzollern castle, probably the most well-known German castle after Neuschwanstein.

Most of all, of course, I hope you will have productive sessions in which you can controversially but constructively discuss your papers. I am looking forward to see many publications coming out of EWIS 2016, from individual papers to edited volumes and special issues. And bear in mind that if you need another small workshop to take the last steps towards a manuscript, the Exploratory Symposia, taking place in Rapallo from 2 to 5 November this year, may just be the right thing for you – the deadline for proposals is 20 June! Furthermore, you have the option to have a quick lunch in the Mensa (student cafeteria) of the University, where coffee breaks will be held. In this case, you have to visit the Info Point inside of the Mensa and obtain a guest card. However, please note that a meal on a guest card will cost you 6-7 Euros, while many of the places above will offer you food at a better quality for 7-8 Euros, and you can grab something to go for far less. So our recommendation is to venture out at lunch and try some of the places suggested above.

Public Transportation and access to the University

As Tübingen is a quite small city, many places are in walking distance. If you prefer taking the bus, several bus lines stop at university. The bus stations 'Uni/Neue Aula' and 'Lothar-Meyer-Bau' (lines 1, 7) as well as 'Gmelinstraße' (lines 3, 18) are both very close to the buildings where the Workshops take place. 


